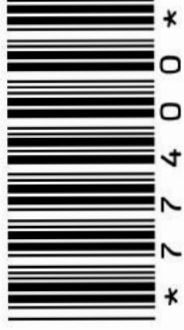
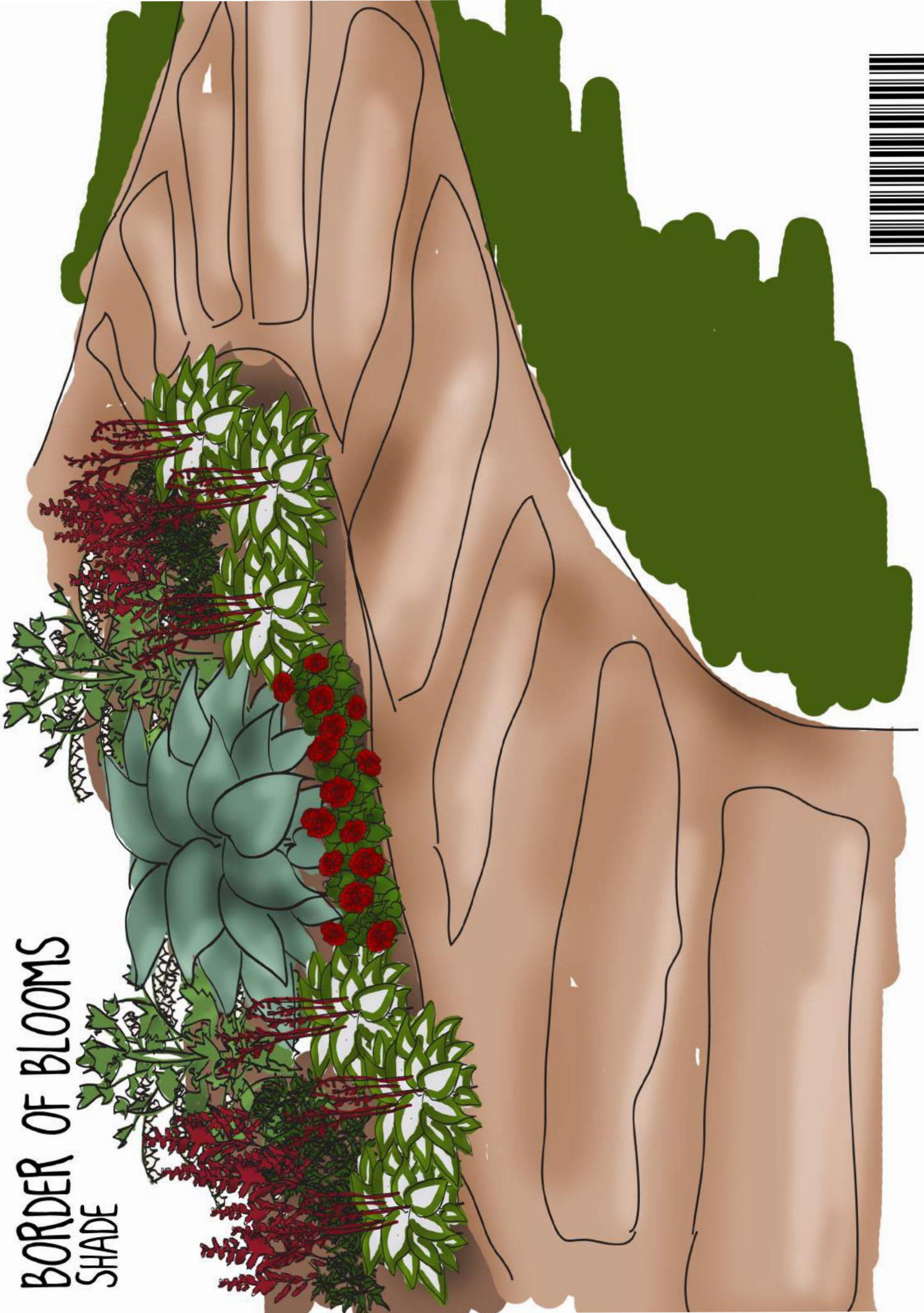


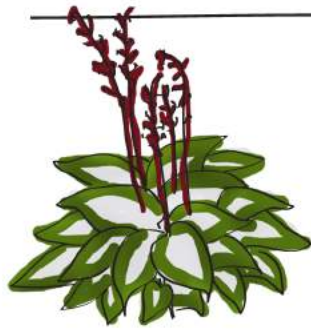
**BORDER OF BLOOMS

SHADE



CHERRY BERRY HOSTA (6)

- Grows 12-18 inches tall
- Small hosta with mounding habit
- Red flower stems with purple flowers in mid-summer



FANAL RED ASTILBE (6)

- Grows 12-20 inches tall
- Great for attracting hummingbirds
- Remove spent blooms to encourage new blooms throughout the summer



BIG DADDY HOSTA (1)

- Grows 22-26 inches tall, 33-48 inches wide
- Large blue-green leaves that become puckered and cupped as they mature



SCARLET BEGONIAS (3)

- Grows 8-14 inches tall, with blooms up to 4 inches wide
- Prefer moist, but not soggy soil. Water when soil is dry to the touch before growth occurs
- If begonias aren't hardy in your zone, overwinter them or plant a new annual next year in its' place



WHITE BLEEDING HEARTS (2)

- Grows 24-36 inches tall
- Blooms in late spring
- Goes dormant mid to late summer but will return the following spring

PLANTING TIPS

1. We suggest you place all of the plants in position before you actually start to dig. This will verify that you have them spaced properly.

2. First plant the Big Daddy Hosta 1-2" deep, in the center of your space, leaving enough distance from the walkway to plant the begonias in front. Plant the begonias 1-2" deep in front of the hosta.

3. Plant the White Bleeding Hearts 1-2" deep on either side of the Big Daddy Hosta, approx 24" away from the center of the hosta plant.

4. Stagger the three Cherry Berry Hostas and plant them 1-2" deep, on either side of the begonias, in front of the White Bleeding Hearts.

5. Plant three Astilbe 1-2" deep, one grouping to either side of the White Bleeding Hearts, behind the Cherry Berry Hostas.

6. Water well after planting and during dry periods.

7. Cut back foliage in fall after first hard frost.
